American Kidney Fund

The American Kidney Fund is providing direct emergency financial assistance to dialysis centers and kidney patients affected by Hurricane Florence. To date we have helped more than 400 patients in North and South Carolina. Funds raised are given to dialysis centers to ensure kidney patients can maintain their dialysis treatment. Patients can use funds to replace medication, purchase food and household items, temporary lodging and transportation to and from medical appointments.

International Medical Corps has deployed a mobile medical clinic, volunteer medical staff and support teams to local shelters in Wilmington and the surrounding counties, providing primary care, dispensing prescriptions and attending to other medical needs. We have donated hygiene kits, medicines and other medical supplies to local federally-qualified health clinics. Funds raised will also provide training to local partners on building a better response and how to build coalitions to provide medical care in a disaster.

Lab Rescue of the LRCP

Lab Rescue has taken an active role in the North Carolina hurricane-impacted area. The Rescue pulled twenty five dogs from shelters prior the storm to free up space for resident dogs, sent a team of volunteers to rescue nine dogs living on a porch surrounded by flood waters whose elderly owner could no longer care for them, and most recently, we are saving dogs given up by their owners to local shelters and bringing them north to areas where there are adopters. The funds raised will provide much-needed veterinary care, including; orthopedic procedures, heartworm treatment, spay/neuter, and more.

Matthew 25's Disaster Response Team arrived in the Carolinas on September 20 with a selection of Matthew 25's fleet of disaster vehicles, and has provided laundry services and disaster relief in a number of locations since arriving last month. Additionally, Matthew 25 has shipped more than 11 truckloads of aid to partners in the disaster areas with more shipments of aid scheduled over the coming weeks.
